MA in Landscape Archaeology - full-time and part-time

The landscape approach in archaeology is an increasingly important avenue for both academic research and contemporary heritage management, with its strong focus on the interaction between people and the world they inhabit.

Drawing on a wide range of expertise in the analysis of prehistoric and historic landscapes, the MA in Landscape Archaeology offers an intensive, one year taught programme in landscape archaeology. The course provides a critical understanding of landscapes and their components, and focuses on the interaction of practical and theoretical approaches in landscape archaeology.

Course level: Level 9

Duration: 1 year, full-time; 2 years, part-time

Entry Requirements: NQAI Level 8 degree, 2nd class honours grade 2 in Archaeology or equivalent. An interview normally forms part of the selection process.

Fees: Current year fees are €6,015 ([full-time, EU](#)) €13,250 ([full-time, non-EU](#)) €3,065 p.a. ([part-time, EU](#)) and are likely to remain at this level for 2017-2018.

Why study Archaeology?

The MA in Landscape Archaeology provides a strong foundation in theory and practice in landscape studies and examines critical sources and resources in the understanding of cultural landscapes. Vocational training, with transferable skills in electronic survey methods, data management and interrogation is also provided. The application of GIS is explored in some detail with a focus on analysis and presentation.

Programme outline

The history of landscape archaeology is explored, as are contemporary writings on the concept of landscape. Various issues surrounding the protection, management, and presentation of archaeological landscapes are considered, and case-studies are used to examine the wide range of such landscapes and their components. There is emphasis on fieldwork training and a critical understanding of the range of sources used. Students are provided with a basic foundation in GIS and its applications in archaeology and are introduced to electronic survey and digital mapping, geophysical prospection, and data processing. Practical demonstrations and field exercises are an important element of the programme.

Employment and career opportunities:

Graduates of the MA in Landscape Archaeology at NUIG are employed in many areas of the profession, while others choose to continue their studies at doctoral level. Graduates seeking employment after the completion of the course commonly find work in archaeological consultancies, in the State sector and in local authorities, are often engaged in archaeological excavations, landscape surveys and pre-development impact assessments for large-scale infrastructural developments.

Higher Diploma (Archaeology) - full-time and part-time

The programme is a one-year, full-time or two-year, part-time programme and is open to students with a degree in any discipline (other than Archaeology) who wish to acquire an academic qualification in archaeology. A basic knowledge of and interest in the subject is desirable.

Course Facts

Course level: Level 8

Duration: 1 year, full-time; 2 years, part-time

Entry Requirements: NQAI Level 7 or level 8 degree or equivalent in any discipline other than Archaeology. Selection is based on the candidate's academic record and their aptitude for the course.

Fees: Current year fees are €5,965 (**full-time, EU**) €13,250 (**full-time, non-EU**) €2,980p.a. (**part-time, EU**) and are likely to remain at this level for 2017-2018

Programme outline

Students will take an approved selection of 12 modules within the Second and Third Year BA programme in Archaeology.
